From the Office of Readings for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time:

A reading from the letter of Pope St. Clement I to the Corinthians

The Lord of the universe has enjoyed peace and harmony for the good of all alike

Let us fix our gaze on the Father and Creator of the whole world, and let us hold on to his peace and blessings, his splendid and surpassing gifts. Let us contemplate him in our thoughts and with our mind's eye reflect upon the peaceful and restrained unfolding of his plan; let us consider the care with which he provides for the whole of his creation.

By his direction the heavens are in motion, and they are subject to him in peace. Day and night fulfil the course he has established without interfering with each other. The sun, the moon and the choirs of stars revolve in harmony at his command in their appointed paths without deviation. By his will the earth blossoms in the proper seasons and produces abundant food for men and animals and all the living things on it without reluctance and without any violation of what he has arranged.

Yet unexplored regions of the abysses and inexpressible realms of the deep are subject to his laws. The mass of the boundless sea, joined together by his ordinance in a single expanse, does not overflow its prescribed limits but flows as he commanded it. For he said: *Thus far shall you come, and your waves will be halted here.* The ocean, impassable for men, and the worlds beyond it are governed by the same edicts of the Lord.

The seasons, spring, summer, autumn and winter, follow one another in harmony. The quarters from which the winds blow function in due season without the least deviation. And the ever-flowing springs, created for our health as well as our enjoyment, unfailingly offer their breasts to sustain human life. The tiniest of living creatures meet together in harmony and peace. The great Creator and Lord of the universe commanded all these things to be established in peace and harmony, in his goodness to all, and in overflowing measure to us who seek refuge in his mercies through our Lord Jesus Christ; to him be glory and majesty for ever and ever. Amen.

From Universalis:

St. Simon, Apostle

Simon is eleventh in the list of the twelve Apostles. He is known as Simon the Zealot, but nothing else is known about him. His other name of "Simon Cananaeus" simply adapts another Hebrew word for "zeal" and has nothing to do with the town of Cana.

St. Jude, Apostle

Jude, also called Thaddaeus, is the apostle who at the Last Supper asked the Lord why he showed himself only to the disciples and not to the world. For many centuries he was scarcely venerated because people confused him with Judas Iscariot. He is the patron saint of lost and desperate causes.

From the Sunday Missal:

The Solemnity of All Saints, which we celebrate today, invites us to raise our gaze to Heaven and to meditate on the fullness of the divine life which awaits us. "We are God's children now; it does not yet appear what we shall be" (1 Jn 3:2): with these words the Apostle John assures us of the reality of our profound relation to God, as too, of the certainty of our destiny. Like beloved children, therefore, we also receive the grace to support the trials of this earthly existence-the hunger and the thirst, for justice, the misunderstandings, the persecutions (Cf. Mt 5:3-11)-and, at the same time we inherit what is promised in the Gospel Beatitudes. The holiness, imprinted in us by Christ himself, is the goal of Christian life. And we have a foretaste of the gift and the beauty of sanctity everytime that we participate in the Eucharistic Liturgy, the communion with the "great multitude" of holy souls, which in Heaven eternally acclaim the salvation of God ad of the Lamb (cf. Rv 7:9-10.)

Today we renew the hope in eternal life, truly founded on Christ's death and Resurrection. "I am risen and I am with you always", the Lord tells us, and my hand supports you. Wherever you may fall, you will fall into my hands and I will be there even to the gates of death. Where no one can accompany you any longer and where you can take nothing with you, there I will wait for you to transform for you, the darkness into light. Christian hope, however, is not solely individual, it is also always a hope for others. Our lives are profoundly linked, one to the other, and the good and the bad that each of us does always affects others too. Hence, the prayer of a pilgrim soul into the world can help another soul that is being purified after death. This is why the Church invites us today to pray for our beloved deceased and to pause at their tombs in the cemeteries.

Encyclical - Dilexit nos on the Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus Christ.

Pope Francis has published his fourth encyclical called Dilexit nos on the Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus Christ.

Introducing the Encyclical Letter 'Dilexit nos – He loved us'

The Bishop of Shrewsbury, Bishop Mark Davies, has welcomed Pope Francis' fourth encyclical letter *Dilexit Nos on the Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus Christ*, as a "great gift" saying that, as the Church seeks to grow in communion, participation and mission, "an authentic path of renewal must pass through the Heart of Jesus."

Introducing the encyclical, Bishop Davies wrote, "the Holy Father offers us a sustained meditation on the Heart of Jesus Christ in the pages of Scripture; in the teaching of the Magisterium; and through the history of devotion to the Sacred Heart, drawing out its profound personal and social implications. In this way, the Pope speaks in continuity with the Church's faith and devotion."

We have surely received a great gift from Pope Francis in the Encyclical Letter *Dilexit nos*. At a moment in history disturbed by so much turmoil and anxiety, Pope Francis invites us to fix our gaze on the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Reminding us in the words of his saintly predecessor, Pope John Paul II, "Christ is the heart of the world, and the paschal mystery of his death and resurrection is the centre of history, which because of him, is a history of salvation" (*Cf. Dilexit nos No. 31*). This is the confidence we regain by contemplating and drawing ever closer to the Heart of our Redeemer allowing us to repeat the emphatic words of Saint Paul "He loved us" (*Rom. 8: 37*).

This invitation by Pope Francis is part of a spiritual thread we can trace through his pontificate from the words of his first homily when he reflected: "We can walk as much as we want, we can build many things, but if we do not confess Jesus Christ, things go wrong"

(Homily to the College of Cardinals, 13 March 2013).

At a moment when the Church seeks ways to grow in communion, participation and mission, he indicates in these pages that an authentic path of renewal must pass through the Heart of Jesus. In *Dilexit nos*, the Holy Father offers us a sustained meditation on the Heart of Jesus Christ in the pages of Scripture; in the teaching of the Magisterium; and through the history of devotion to the Sacred Heart, drawing out its profound personal and social implications. In this way, the Pope speaks in continuity with the Church's faith and devotion. It is on this firm basis that he calls for a renewal of devotion to the Heart of Jesus in our time. Indeed, the Holy Father insists "Devotion to Christ's heart is essential for our Christian life to the extent that it expresses our openness in faith and adoration to the mystery of the Lord's divine and human love" (*DN No. 83*).

The Pope notes certain representations of the Sacred Heart might strike us "as tasteless and not particularly conducive to affection or prayer. Yet this is of little importance, since they are only invitations to prayer..." (*DN No. 57*).

In his scriptural meditation, he invites us to always see the unity between "The Christ we see depicted with a pierced and burning heart," and "the same Christ who, for love of us, was born in Bethlehem, passed through Galilee healing the sick, embracing sinners and showing mercy. The same Christ who loved us to the very end..." (*DN No. 51*).

Pope Francis accordingly points us all to the Eucharistic Heart of Jesus and quotes England's newest Saint, John Henry Newman, who "encountered the living heart of Jesus" in the Eucharist and prayed "O most Sacred, most loving Heart of Jesus, Thou art concealed in the Holy Eucharist, and Thou beatest for us still..." (*DN no.26*).

In this encyclical letter, Pope Francis invites us to this encounter and to make the same discovery in our lives.
