### **EDITORIAL**

#### Dear All,

On one of the hottest Sundays this July was Sea Sunday. Sea Sunday is a day to pray for seafarers and fishers because we owe them more than we are aware of. "Eternal Father, strong to save, Whose arm hath bound the restless wave, Who bid'st the mighty ocean deep Its own appointed limits keep; O hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea."

King's Lynn is a port and market town. And so, we are familiar with the screech of seagulls, with the tidal times of the estuary River Ouse, we breathe brackish air and are supplied with fresh fish daily.

For us, the sea is a dangerous element - but not so for Jesus. How often did Iesus 'cross over to the other side of the Sea of Galilee' to get away from the crowds! Jesus walked on water. He was undisturbed by a fierce storm raging on the Sea of Galilee - he calmed the storm. Jesus called his first disciples, Simon, then called Peter, and his brother Andrew when they were fishing on the Lake of Galilee. The most crucial story, this time happening on the shore of the Sea Tiberias, is the third encounter of the resurrected Jesus with his disciples. Peter, lost and overwhelmed by the events concerning Jesus, appears to want to go back to his old trade, saying "I'm going out to fish," and some of the other disciples came with him. lesus blocked Peter's attempt to resume his old trade of fishing; he established him as the 'rock' of the Christian Church. In ACTS we find the story of the ship that carried Paul as prisoner from Jerusalem to Rome. The ship was shipwrecked in a frightful winter storm on the island of Malta. Miraculously, everyone survived.

Water, boats and fishing play a noticeable part in the Gospels. The very beginning of the history, the survival and the growth of the Christian Church are intimately linked with this unstable, unpredictable element–water- that Jesus used and uses to teach us to trust and to baptise.

I wish you a delightful golden October.

### THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

**John Cairns** used to write articles for the Lynn News and the Grape Vine Magazine regularly. He and his wife Miriam moved to Gloucester last year. They are still very attached to our Church and so John offered some of his articles as contribution to the Grape Vine magazine.

The Pope is obviously a person of deep humanity. We can admire his reaching out to others. He is, like many of us, concerned about the mockery and satirising of religious belief. He compared defending religion to punching someone who might have insulted his mother. There is such a thing as righteous anger.

In the New Testament it says Jesus 'found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the moneychangers at their business. And making a whip of cords, he drove them all, with the sheep and oxen, out of the temple'.

We don't know what injuries Jesus inflicted with his whip of cords or how large this improvised whip was, but he did use force and used it effectively.

Jesus also said 'Temptations to sin are sure to come; but woe to him by whom they come. It would be better for him if a millstone were hung round his neck and he were cast into the sea'.

A punch on the nose seems a very moderate statement compared to being drowned in the sea. What would any of us do if our mother, or our cherished beliefs were attacked? Pope Francis would certainly not condone killing anyone, but some influential people would like to imply that he would. There is a climate of belittling religions in the name of press freedom, but editorial selection of news is biased in many ways. Let us have the freedom to proclaim our religious beliefs without caricature.

The Canonisation of the two young saints, Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati, who were born exactly 90 years apart, touches us profoundly. We live in a time when Christianity is attacked and bullied, so much so that the effect of this stifling is eroding family life, is causing loss of faith, loneliness, and the feeling of being without purpose and hope. Both saints died at a very young age; Carlos died when he was 15 years old and Giorgio died at the age of 24. Whichever website one is consulting about these two new saints one reads that they were 'men of their time', and by being so, inspired the young as well as the elderly, the poor and the affluent. No wonder that there is a wide range of books available about them, some also as audio books.

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
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### FEN LINE USERS **ASSOCIATION**

### Pope Leo's Message to Grandparents and the Elderly

'The life of the Church and the world can only be understood in light of the passage of generations. Demand for spaces remains high, with approximately three referrals received for every available bed. Many guests experience complex needs, and the shelter offers them a private room along with round-the-clock care.

MARY'S KITCHEN: "We are very desperate for new Volunteers for Mary's Kitchen", which is a permanent example of a corporate act of Mercy, feeding the hungry in the Wrigglesworth room each Saturday. KSC are proud to provide support to the Kitchen. Guests enjoy the heartier soups, such as chicken & vegetable / lamb & vegetable / beef & vegetable, together with baked beans-based food. ### **CAFOD, Harvest Family Fast Day**

In today's volatile and rapidly changing world, CAFOD remains committed to working alongside the most marginalised people and building a better future. Our hope is inspired by the firm and reassuring certainty of God's love, poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit.

In this Jubilee Year we are invited to be pilgrims of hope, walking in solidarity with our global family. In his message for the World Day of the Poor, Pope Leo calls us to rediscover Christian hope as a response to global instability and "offer new signs of hope" bearing witness to charity.

CAFOD is the official overseas aid agency of the Catholic Church in England and Wales. We believe God wants everyone to flourish — yet many people are struggling with conflict, the climate crisis, inequality and injustice.

That's why we stand defiantly, side by side, with our sisters and brothers around the world, supporting them to face these injustices wherever and whenever they encounter them. We help all people, regardless of background, so that together we can build a better, fairer world – as God intended.

CAFOD's Family Fast Day is a tradition, particularly during Lent or Harvest, where individuals and families are encouraged to eat simply and donate the money saved to CAFOD to support global development projects addressing poverty, conflict, and the climate crisis.

By fasting from a meal, praying, and giving donations, participants support local experts who provide people with the essential tools, training, and resources needed to overcome hardship and build sustainable futures for themselves and their communities.

Family Fast Day has been at the heart of CAFOD since its inception. CAFOD was born when a team came together with others from the National Board of Catholic Women, the Catholic Women's League and the Union of Catholic Mothers to organise the first Family Fast Day in 1960. Due to the number of collections taking place across the dioceses, two years later, the Bishop's Conference of England and Wales registered CAFOD as an official charity.

The very first Family Fast Day was on Friday 11th March 1960. The volunteers were responding to an appeal from the people of the Caribbean island of Dominica where children were starving, to help raise funds for a mother-and-baby clinic.

Everyone in the family was asked to make an act of self-denial. They asked children to give up their sweets and for their parents to make just one main meal for the family – the cheapest possible – and give the money they saved to feed people who were hungry. This remains at the heart of CAFOD Family Fast Days today.

As well as funding the new clinic, the project also helped people to survive and make a living for themselves, including providing water and teaching people how to plant vegetable gardens. This determination to reach those most in need and help people fulfil their potential is still at the heart of CAFOD's mission.

The organisers expected to raise just a few hundred pounds, but the Catholic community responded to the appeal with amazing generosity, donating more than £6,000 - the equivalent of over £100,000 today. However, raising money has not been the whole story.

CAFOD Family Fast Day has always been as much about prayer as about giving to help those living in poverty. One of the first Fast Day organisers explained: "We were very keen that we should do it not just as a giving thing, but as a praying thing. We should really make an effort to remember people, not just by giving them food, but by doing what we could do to support them.

"We weren't doing anything special, we were just doing what we thought we ought to do, remembering that we are all God's children." As we prepare in our own homes to celebrate Family Fast Day, here is a Prayer to remind us of the real difference we can make with our own thoughts and actions.

### THE KNIGHTS OF SAINT COLUMBA

Saint Columba was born Colum in County Donegal in AD 521.He was of noble extraction from Niall, King of Ireland. He learned the Divine Scriptures and the lessons of an ascetic life under the Bishop, Saint Finian. He entered the Priesthood in AD 546 and in a short time had many disciples.

His manner of living was always most austere and he never interrupted his fast; yet his devotion was neither morose nor severe. It was in Iona, off the Isle of Mull that Saint Columba came ashore from Ireland in AD 563 and began the Christianisation of Scotland. Iona has been a place of pilgrimage and veneration throughout the centuries, for reasons of faith it was also a cradle of the Celtic Kingdom of Scotland.

Fast forward to 1919 when a group of 24 men of vision led by PJ OCallaghan, an Irish man from Cork, recognised the need for an organisation based on strictly Catholic and democratic ideas. The founders at the outset decided on a ritualistic Order, as the Church itself was ritualistic.

The Order as far as possible was to be modelled on the Knights of Columbus, founded in The United States by Father Michael McGivney in 1881. Thus, the new Order would be called the Knights of Saint Columba. The news of the recently formed organisation spread and in the following weeks over 100 Catholic Gentlemen applied for membership. The first initiation ceremony took place on the 9th of November 1919. On St Patrick's Day 1920, The Knights held a concert in St Andrews Hall Glasgow, and because of this event, several hundred applications for membership were received. The Knights of Saint Columba had arrived.

### ICONS IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

For the first millennium of the Church, there were two "worlds", the Roman and the Byzantine. These worlds were not only geographically but also culturally and linguistically separate; the Roman world largely spoke Latin; the Byzantine largely spoke Greek.


What this means is that, over time, two theological systems developed, independently of each other, because this was prior to the age of the internet, you had access only to the information around you. So, two different theologies of images also develop out of these two worlds.

In the East, icons take on a very specific theological meaning. They are seen as windows into heaven, such that the believer looking upon an icon is not looking at a painting on wood, but is as if looking through a portal, looking at the heavenly reality itself.

The West never develops this understanding of images. In the Roman world, the believer looks on an image of a sacred reality, and this image raises the mind above the image to the reality, something by which the believer is moved upwards. For this reason, Western art has a tendency to portray subjects in a much more realistic way, through artistic realism and statues.

Before I moved to cosmopolitan King's Lynn, I was Parish Secretary at a small church in rural Kent. The Parish Priest had travelled, in his younger days, extensively in the Soviet Union and had become a great collector of icons (copies of course!) Through him I began my own interest in icons and wrote about several in the Parish Newsletter.

I would like to share with you two icons, one is probably the most well known in the west, and the other one is one of my most cherished!



Firstly, the icon Christ Pantocrator (from the Greek pantos meaning all, and kratos meaning strength, might or power), now known in the west as Christ in Majesty, has come to suggest Christ as a mild but stern, all powerful judge of humanity. The image of Christ Pantocrator was one of the first images of Christ developed and remains a central icon of the Eastern Orthodox Church. In the image, Christ holds the New Testament in his left hand and makes the gesture of teaching or of blessing with his right. This imagery is a common feature in Byzantine churches, often found in

the central dome, and represents Christ's eternal nature as God, creator, and judge.

The second icon is called The Virgin of Tenderness. It portrays the bond of intimacy between the Mother of God and her son Jesus. Their cheeks meet in loving embrace, and their eyes in a gaze of mutual compassion. The icon depicts the Virgin Mary mourning the passion of her son which has been made known to her by Simeon.

Leonid Ouspensky, in his book Theology of the Icon, marvellously describes the working of grace in the soul of the Virgin at this moment: "In all the variety of human feelings those connected with motherhood are the most intense, far more than any others they are connected not only with inner but also with physical life. In the Icon of Tenderness, the motherly caress of the Mother of God is indissolubly

connected with her tormenting pain for her son. The compassion she feels for Him becomes transformed into motherly compassion for all creatures for whom He voluntarily sacrifices Himself. Contact with the Deity transforms motherly tenderness into all-embracing love and grief for the whole of creation."

### **KEEPING SUNDAY SPECIAL**

For many, especially for those who work or are in education, Monday marks the start of a new week. However, for the Jewish people who rest on Saturday and still keep it as the Sabbath Day it is Sunday that marks the first day of the week as, according to the Book of Exodus, the Sabbath is a day of rest, commanded by God to be kept as a holy day of rest, as God rested from creation on the seventh day.

For the early Christians, Sunday, the day on which Jesus rose from the dead, became a festive day and although Christianity didn't become the official religion of Rome until 380AD, some years earlier in 321AD Emperor Constantine enacted a law which stated that on Sunday, "the venerable day of the sun", all judges, city people, and craftsmen were to rest from their work, regardless of their religious beliefs.

What is permissible on the Sabbath Day, or on a Sunday, has been debated over the centuries and still divides opinion to this day. The Pharisees, who adhered strictly to the law, and were always looking for a way to catch Jesus breaking it, disapproved of Him healing a

man on the Sabbath. Jesus chose to put compassion above the law and indeed there are no major religions which would advocate not helping one's fellow man in times of need, regardless of the day.

Sunday too has been the subject of various restrictions over the years with some keen to see even stricter rules enforced. In the 1800's, bakeries were not permitted to bake bread on a Sunday, but they still lit their ovens that day and provided a valuable service to that large section of the population who didn't have an oven at home. Many families lived in a single room where a fire, as well as providing a source of warmth, perhaps allowed just the basic cooking of food in a pot. For those who were fortunate enough to be able to eat meat once a week, they would take their dinner to the bakers who would cook it for them, often while they attended the morning church service. Compassion was clearly not on the mind of wealthy Sir Andrew Agnew MP who, having no need of baker's ovens himself, tried four times to bring a bill through Parliament that would have closed the bakeries, stopped all secular work on Sunday's and outlawed many forms of harmless entertainment as well. None of his attempts were successful.

Closing everything on a Sunday, however well intentioned, simply isn't practical. Hospitals and care homes still need to carry out their essential roles, as does public transport that gets people to their work there. The emergency services too simply can't stand down for one day a week. However, it's fair to say that Sunday for many is now just another day of the week, something that was recognised many years ago by the "Keep Sunday Special" movement which on 27th August this year marked its 40th anniversary. It was founded by Dr. Michael Schluter in response to proposed changes to the Sunday Trading Laws which at the time stopped large shops from opening on a Sunday. Faith and community groups were worried about attendance at church and the effect on family time spent at home, whilst the trade unions were concerned that employees would be forced to work on a Sunday against their will. Eventually, a comprise was reached and large shops were permitted to open for just six hours, whilst Sunday working was to be on a voluntary basis only. I'm old enough to remember when shops were closed on a Sunday, and when they often closed for a half day, or indeed a whole day, during the week too, and we all seemed to manage back then. But I was also reminded that for nearly 25 years of my working life I regularly worked on a Saturday morning so for me Sunday was the only day of the week when I didn't work, which itself made it a special day!

Attending Mass once a week, be it on Sunday, or at the vigil mass on Saturday makes that day special and the fact that we make time to do so gives us a chance to put aside, at least for a short while, those worldly matters which demand so much of our time. In 1998 Pope John Paul II wrote his apostolic letter *Dies Domini* which makes interesting reading on this subject. Speaking of the various dimensions of the Christian celebration of Sunday, the document says that it is Dies Domini with regard to the work of creation, Dies Christi as the day of the new creation and the Risen Lord's gift of the Holy Spirit, Dies Ecclesiae as the day on which the Christian community gathers for the celebration, and *Dies Hominis* as the day of joy, rest and fraternal charity. Pope John Paul says: "The link between the Lord's Day and the day of rest in civil society has a meaning and importance which go beyond the distinctly Christian point of view. The alternation between work and rest, built into human nature, is willed by God himself, and is something "sacred", because it is man's way of withdrawing from the sometimes excessively demanding cycle of earthly tasks in order to renew his awareness that everything is the work of God". He adds: "there remains the obligation to ensure that everyone can enjoy the freedom, rest and relaxation which human dignity requires, together with the associated religious, family, cultural and interpersonal needs which are difficult to meet if there is no guarantee of at least one day of the week on which people can both rest and celebrate."
